II. Invited Column

The clinical experiential resources in Canadian pharmacy schools: an educational experience.

Canada has focused on the development of higher education to reach top international levels, particularly in pharmacy education. In 2010, the Canadian Pharmacists Association CPA supported the joint resolution of the Association of Faculties of Pharmacy of Canada (AFPC) and Association of Deans of Pharmacy of Canada (ADPC) on the Doctor of Pharmacy (PharmD) to be the First Professional Degree at Universities in Canada. This decision commits faculties to replace their concurrent baccalaureate pharmacy curricula with a comprehensive Doctor of Pharmacy. In response, the Canadian Council for Accreditation of Pharmacy Programs CCAPP amended in 2014 their accreditation standards (CCAPP, 2014). It included a minimum of 40 weeks (1600 hours) of experiential clinical training time which has to be adopted by pharmacy schools for accreditation. Currently, clinical experiential learning experiences consist of at least eight weeks of community pharmacy setting practice, and 36 weeks of advance clinical experiences covered during the third and fourth year of the PharmD program primarily in advance community and hospital clinical settings. In 2014, a revised Professional Competencies for Canadian Pharmacists at Entry to Practice was issued by the National Association of Pharmacy Regulatory Authorities (NAPRA), and the pharmD was considered as an entry-level degree to the pharmacy profession in Canada illustrating the fastpaced evolution of the field (NAPRA, 2014).

The Canadian pharmacy schools in collaboration with pharmaceutical associations and other health care officials jointly have necessitated and standardized the number of credits, contact hours, and training periods students undertake in clinical experiences. The joint collaboration has identified different health-care sites and advance patient-care departments for students practice such as ambulatory care, rehabilitation, and Cardiovascular intensive care unit (CICU). Students in these clinical pharmacy training sites will gain a number of experiences, first, in applied therapeutics and drug therapy problems with respect to patient assessment and patient monitoring. Second, direct communication with patients to set targeted outcomes and provide patient education. Third professional communication and collaborative work with other healthcare professionals in terms of patient's medication plan and outcome.

III. Faculty Development Program, 15th and 16th July 2019 at College of Pharmaceutical Sciences, DSU, Bangalore

College of Pharmaceutical Sciences, Dayananda Sagar University (DSU), Kumaraswamy Layout, Bangalore conducted a 5 days Faculty Development Programme on 'Research Methodology and Digital Initiatives in Teaching Health Sciences' sponsored jointly by APTI and DSU.

Two days of the program was resourced by Dr. BG Nagavi and Mr. Kaplesh from HESDAR Centre, Mysore. The program was conducted in the domains of Leadership, Attitude, Motivation and Performance (LAMP) and Class Room Management (CRM). The program consisted of pre and posttest sessions, activities and group discussions on LAMP and CRM. Dr. BG Nagavi discussed about the attributes of a leader such as creativity, flexibility, sensitivity, courage, charismatic, listening skill, honesty and integrity. He indicated on the difference between a leader and a manager: a leader does the right things while a manager does things right. Further he explained that an academic leader should be an inspiratory, effective communicator, innovator, motivator, visionary, risk taker and possess good interpersonal skills. He briefed the delegates on the characters of a destructive leader. He detailed on the intrinsic and extrinsic motivation techniques and informed that personalities having fire in the bellies and the personalities thriving on to monetary incentives were exemplified as intrinsic and extrinsic motivation, respectively.

During CRM session, he explained about techniques for better class room management such as eye to eye contact on the entire class, usage of softer voice so students listen effectively, give students non-verbal cues and effective planning of lessons and the mode to deliver effectively and confidently. He expatiated on indifferent behavior of students acclaiming sensitiveness and incorporated various possible modes of responses to handle the issues and steer-up positive cooperation in bringing-forth excellence in difficult students. The program was conducted in the workshop format with clear & measurable Learning Outcomes, guided activities, discussions, presentations & feedback. HESDARC thanks Dr. V Murugan, Dean, College of Pharmacy DSU, for the initiative and arranging the program.
